THE ROGIE CUP

KINGS HOCKEY OPERATIONS

DEAN LOMBARDI - PRESIDENT/GENERAL MANAGER

The Kings entered into a new executive era when the club announced the hiring of Dean Lombardi as Kings President/General Manager on April 21, 2006. A veteran of nearly 20 NHL seasons in the front office as an executive and a pro scout, Lombardi has a well-earned reputation for being one of hockey's true visionaries while possessing a solid track record of success.

Lombardi -- formerly a member of the San Jose Sharks front office for 13 years, including seven seasons as General Manager, and most recently a Pro Scout for the Philadelphia Flyers the two seasons prior to joining the Kings -- became the eighth General Manager in Kings history and is solely responsible for all hockey operations decisions, including all player-personnel moves at the NHL level, directing the professional and amateur scouting staffs, negotiating all contract matters, and overseeing the Manchester Monarchs of the American Hockey League, the Kings' primary affiliate.

With the Kings, Lombardi has increased the club's overall depth and talent with the intention of building a roster that is considerably younger than when he came aboard. Lombardi and his staff have focused on strengthening the club's reserve list and on building from within, as the Kings made 10 selections in the 2007 NHL Entry Draft and they also hold 12 selections in the 2008 NHL Entry Draft, including two in the first-round. Lombardi has also re-shaped the Kings current roster by adding more mobility on the blueline, and he has positioned the club well under the salary cap in future years to help keep the organization's homegrown talent while allowing the club's younger talent to properly develop.

Lombardi's first bold move with the Kings came when he hired Marc Crawford as Head Coach. Crawford is the Kings' first head coach with a Stanley Cup on his resume and he is also the third youngest coach to reach 400 victories. Lombardi then hired former goalie standout Ron Hextall as the club's Assistant General Manager. At the 2006 NHL Entry Draft, Lombardi and the Kings chose goalie Jonathan Bernier 11th overall and the Kings also engineered a trade to get another first-round draft choice, which they used to select center Trevor Lewis 17th overall. A few months later the Kings traded for defenseman Jack Johnson, who was the third overall selection in the 2005 NHL Entry Draft. Also that summer Lombardi and the Kings were aggressive in the free agent market, signing All-Star defenseman Rob Blake, the former Kings captain and Norris Trophy winner, as well as a number of other respected veterans.

This past summer, the Kings signed five unrestricted free agents in Michal Handzus, Tom Preissing, Kyle Calder, Ladislav Nady and Brad Stuart to go along with a core group that includes Anze Kopitar, Michael Cammalleri, Alexander Frolov, Lubomir Visnovsky, Dustin Brown, Blake and Johnson. Lombardi and the Kings also selected defenseman Thomas Hickey with the fourth overall selection in the annual NHL Entry Draft.

During his tenure as General Manager in San Jose from 1996-2003, Lombardi helped build the Sharks into one of the premier teams in the NHL. Under Lombardi, San Jose reached the playoffs five times -- highlighted by two trips to the Western Conference Semifinals -- and one Pacific Division title in 2002 after his club earned a franchise-record 99 points. The Lombardi-led Sharks in 2002 also tied an NHL-record with consecutive seasons of improved point totals (Bill Torrey/New York Islanders) while building a roster that became progressively younger in age each season.

During his time as General Manager in San Jose, Lombardi made many key personnel and player moves -- stocking the Sharks organization with a good mix of veteran stars and up-and-coming youngsters -- that helped make the Sharks legitimate Stanley Cup contenders, and the year after Lombardi left the franchise -- when the Sharks advanced to the Western Conference Finals -- 18 of the players on that highly-successful playoff club were originally acquired by Lombardi.

From the NHL Entry Draft, Lombardi was one of the first General Managers in the NHL to consistently and aggressively maneuver up and down the draft boards, making multiple trades to enhance and improve his club's draft position. His work helped bring San Jose players like Patrick Marleau, Vesa Toskala, Jonathan Cheechoo, Stuart, Scott Hannan, Marco Sturm, Marcel Goc and Christian Ehrhoff. The Hockey News ranked the Sharks' prospects (age 22 and under) as the best in the NHL in 1999-00 and second best in 2000-01. Lombardi also, upon leaving the Sharks, left the hockey operations division in fine shape for the immediate and long-term future as the team in 2003 had six draft choices, including two first-round draft choices, in the first three rounds of that year's Entry Draft (all originally acquired by Lombardi) which significantly helped set the team up to enjoy the success that it has the past several seasons.

One of the fore runners engineering three-way trades, Lombardi's history in San Jose as it relates to trades and free agency is impressive as well, having brought in such players as Owen Nolan, Teemu Selanne, Adam Graves, Vincent Damphousse, Mike Ricci, Kyle McClaren, Mike Vernon, Todd Harvey, Bryan Marchment and Scott Thornton. In addition, Lombardi was able to keep goalie Evgeni Nabokov during the 2000 Expansion Draft (from two new teams) and he hired Darryl Sutter to be the club's head coach in 1997 and Ron Wilson in 2002.

An executive in the San Jose front office since 1990, Lombardi first served as Assistant General Manager -- a post he held the previous two seasons with the Minnesota North Stars -- for the expansion Sharks before being elevated to Vice President, Director of Hockey Operations in 1992. Four years later, he was promoted to Executive Vice President and General Manager and given the responsibility of turning around the young franchise.

In his first season at the helm, the 1996-97 campaign, the Sharks finished with the fourth most improved victory total in the NHL to begin Lombardi's impressive streak of year-by-year improvement with San Jose, which included the five straight post-season appearances from 1997-02 when the Sharks were just one of seven NHL clubs to qualify for the playoffs during that five-year stretch, while designing a roster that became younger while ensuring the Sharks long-term success.

Prior to taking over as the club's General Manager, Lombardi helped the Sharks construct a team that posted the greatest single-season turnaround in NHL history when the 1993-94 Sharks earned 82 points and the franchise's first berth in the playoffs after the team improved by 58 points from the prior season (the 1992-93 Sharks had 24 points). As General Manager, another one of Lombardi's many highlights was the Sharks' 2000 first-round playoff upset of the St. Louis Blues when San Jose, as the eighth seed, won a thrilling seven-game series over the President's Trophy-winning Blues.

Off the ice, Lombardi was also successful in San Jose for creating and implementing an off-ice model development program that was designed to improve overall player performance particularly in the area of fundamentals. The principals and philosophies of the model were based loosely off an advanced program used by Major League Baseball.

Born in Holyoke, Massachusetts, and raised in nearby Ludlow, Lombardi received his undergraduate degree from the University of New Haven where he finished third in his class. On the ice he was the hockey team's captain his final two seasons, and he received a full athletic scholarship and the school's Student-Athlete of the Year Award. In 1985, Lombardi earned his Law Degree (with honors) from Tulane Law School where he specialized in Labor Law.

Prior to joining the North Stars, Lombardi spent three seasons as a player representative, including the representation of five members of the 1988 United States Olympic Team, and at the time he joined Minnesota's front office Lombardi was only the second former player agent to be employed in an NHL front office (Brian Burke/Vancouver Canucks was the other).

Dean and his wife Wandamae reside in Manhattan Beach.

RON HEXTALL - ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Ron Hextall is in his second season with the Kings as Assistant General Manager. He also serves as General Manager of the Manchester Monarchs of the American Hockey League, the Kings' primary affiliate.

Hextall, 43 (5/3/64), assists President/General Manager Dean Lombardi in all facets of the Kings Hockey Operations department, including contract negotiations and player personnel, and overseeing the organization's top prospects. With Manchester, he oversees that organization's hockey operations department, and this past season the club advanced to the Eastern Conference Finals for the first time in franchise history.

A native of Brandon, Manitoba, Hextall, prior to joining the Kings, spent the previous four years as Director of Pro Hockey Personnel for the Philadelphia Flyers, a club for which he played 11 standout seasons. He joined the Flyers front office in 1999 as a Pro Scout and he was elevated to his most recent position in 2002. In his front office positions with the Flyers, Hextall was instrumental in the club's great success, which included three Atlantic Division titles and two trips to the Eastern Conference Finals (losing to eventual Stanley Cup Champions both times) while the club averaged nearly 102 points per season.

Prior to his role in the front office, Hextall enjoyed a stellar 13-year NHL career as a goaltender for the Flyers, New York Islanders and Quebec Nordiques that was highlighted by his rookie 1986-87 season with the Flyers. During that season, he was awarded the Vezina Trophy as the NHL's top goaltender and the Conn Smythe Trophy as the Most Valuable Player in the 1987 Stanley Cup Finals, despite losing to the Edmonton Oilers in seven games. At the conclusion of Game 7, Hextall became just the fourth player in the then 23-year history of the trophy to win the award while being a member of the losing team in the Finals. He was also named to both the NHL All-Rookie and NHL First All-Star Teams that season.

Originally selected by the Flyers in the sixth-round (119th overall) in the 1982 NHL Entry Draft, Ron is the fourth Hextall to play in the NHL following his father, Bryan Jr., his grandfather, Hall of Famer Bryan, Sr., and his uncle Dennis, who played for the Kings during the 1969-70 season. He played in 608 regular season games and recorded a 296-214-69 record including 23 shutouts, a 2.97 goals-against-average and a .895 save-percentage, and in 93 playoff games he was 47-43 with two shutouts. He holds numerous Flyers franchise goaltending records, including an NHL-record 113 penalty minutes in 1988-89. He also owns the franchise records for most career games played (489), career wins (240), career points (26), career penalty minutes (476) and most career playoff wins (45) by a Flyers goalie.

Hextall, known for being one of the first goalies to regularly leave the goalmouth and play the puck with his stick and for creative and unique designs on his goalie mask, also participated in the Stanley Cup Finals with the Flyers in 1997 against the Detroit Red Wings. On December 8, 1987, he became the first goaltender in the history of the NHL to score a goal by shooting the puck into the net as the Flyers defeated the Boston Bruins by a score of 5-2 at the Spectrum. On April 11, 1989, during a Flyers 8-5 playoff victory against the Washington Capitals at the Capital Centre, he collected his second career goal and became the first goalie to score a goal in an NHL playoff game.

Ron and his wife Diane live in Manhattan Beach with their two daughters Kristin and Rebecca, and two sons Jeffrey and Brett.

KINGS COACHING STAFF

MARC CRAWFORD - HEAD COACH

The Kings hired Marc Crawford as the club's Head Coach on May 22, 2006. The 21st head coach in Kings history, Crawford formerly was the Head Coach of the Vancouver Canucks and Colorado Avalanche/Quebec Nordiques, where he won a Stanley Cup in 1996 with the Avalanche, and he is the youngest coach in NHL history to win the Jack Adams Trophy for Coach Of The Year.

Now in his second season with the Kings, Crawford, 46 (2/13/61), continues to guide a roster that features some of the best top young talent in the NHL. Last year Crawford helped lead the Kings to a power play success rate of 18.3 percent, which was the highest for the club since the 2001-02 season, and he also earned his 1,000th career regular season point behind the bench. Overall, he currently is the 16th winningest coach in NHL history with 438 career regular season wins and he is the all-time leader in regular season wins for Vancouver with 246.

Hired by the Canucks in January of 1999, Crawford compiled a 246-213-70 record in 529 regular season games over seven seasons in Vancouver and the Canucks made the playoffs four of the last five seasons he was there. In 2003-04, the Canucks won the Northwest Division title (the franchise's first division title since 1992-93) and in 2003 the Canucks advanced to the Western Conference Semifinals.

Crawford began his NHL coaching career with Quebec in 1994 and in his first season he became the youngest coach to win the Jack Adams Trophy. After the Nordiques relocated to Denver he won the Stanley Cup in 1996 and with the win became the third-youngest coach in NHL history to raise Lord Stanley. Colorado went 16-6 that post-season and swept Florida in the Finals.

Crawford's four seasons with Colorado/Quebec were marked by incredible success. In addition to the Stanley Cup, the franchise's first, Crawford helped lead the Avalanche to the Western Conference Finals the following year as his Colorado playoff teams combined to go 26-13 in 1996 and 1997.

The franchise also enjoyed a tremendous amount of success in the regular season. Crawford's 1994-95 Nordiques won the first of nine consecutive divisional titles (the streak was snapped by the Crawford-led Canucks in 2003-04) for the club, and from 1994-98 his win totals were as follows: 30 (in just 48 games), 47, a then-franchise record 49 and 39.

Crawford coached the Avalanche for two seasons after winning the Cup before leaving following the 1997-98 season. He then spent time providing analysis for CBC's Hockey Night in Canada before being hired as the 15th head coach of the Canucks, the club he played every game of his nine-year professional career with.

As a left wing, Crawford recorded 50 points (19-31=50) and 229 penalty minutes in 176 regular season NHL games from 1981-87. He was a rookie on the Canucks team that reached the Stanley Cup Finals in 1982 and he was a member of two Memorial Cup championship teams with Cornwall in 1980 and 1981. He was also named to the Memorial Cup All-Star Team in 1981.

Crawford's coaching accomplishments also include stints behind the bench for Team Canada. A native of Belleville, Ontario, Crawford served as the Head Coach in the 1998 Winter Olympic Games in Nagano where his squad finished first in its pool and advanced to the semifinals before losing to the eventual champions, the Czech Republic, 2-1 in a shootout. Crawford also served as an Assistant Coach for Team Canada for the silver medal-winning squad at the 1996 World Cup of Hockey.

Prior to taking over the Nordiques, Crawford spent three seasons as the Head Coach of St. John's in the American Hockey League and two seasons with Cornwall of the Ontario Hockey League. He has worked as a professional coach every season since 1989-90 (with the exception of the 2004-05 NHL season which was cancelled).

Overall, in 12 seasons and 905 games behind the bench as an NHL head coach, Crawford, has compiled a regular season record of 438-342-125 and a playoff mark of 43-40. He is also the first head coach in Kings history to have a Stanley Cup on his resume.

Marc and his wife Helene have two children: daughter Kaitlin, and son Dylan. They reside in Manhattan Beach.

MIKE JOHNSTON - ASSOCIATE COACH

Mike Johnston is in his second season as an Associate Coach with the Kings. He was named to his position on July 10, 2006.

Prior to joining the Kings Johnston most recently served as Associate Coach in Vancouver from 1999-2006, where he played a major role in the team's development while working with Marc Crawford. In 2004, after a second consecutive 100-point season and a third straight campaign with more than 40 wins, the Canucks captured the Northwest Division championship - the first division title for the franchise since the 1992-93 season.

In May of this last year Johnston was an Assistant Coach for Canada at the World Championships in Moscow where Canada -- for the first time in 73 years -- went undefeated (9-0) in winning the gold medal. This was Johnston's second World Championship after winning in Helsinki in 1997 and his fourth medal at that level (bronze in 1995 and silver in 1996). Kings forward Michael Cammalleri was also a part of the most recent Canadian championship.

Internationally Johnston worked for Team Canada for five seasons from 1994-99 serving in the capacity of General Manager and Associate Coach and finally Head Coach for the 1998-1999 season. He was with Crawford as an Assistant Coach at the 1998 Winter Olympic Games in Nagano, Japan. In addition to the championships at the senior level Johnston has won three gold medals as Head Coach for Canada at the prestigious Spengler Cup Tournament and two World Junior Championships as an Assistant Coach in 1994 and 1995.

A career coach, Johnston initially started at the College and University level in Canada. He coached College hockey in Alberta for five seasons before becoming the Head Coach of the University of New Brunswick from 1989 – 1994 winning two McAdam Division titles, three first place finishes and an overall record of 77-44-6. He was named the 3M Coach of the Year 1994 and won the Telegraph Journal Coach of the Year Award in 1993.

Born in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, Johnston holds a Master's degree in Coaching Science and he recently co-authored the book "Simply The Best - Insights and Strategies From Great Hockey Coaches." Johnston has presented at major International Conferences in Russia, Austria, Switzerland, Finland, and Sweden.

Mike and his wife, Myrna, have two children: a daughter Gabrielle and a son Adam. They reside in Manhattan Beach.

DAVE LEWIS - ASSISTANT COACH

Dave Lewis is in his first season with the Kings as an Assistant Coach. He was named to the position on August 28, 2007.

Lewis has served as a head coach and an assistant coach in the NHL for the past 20 years following a 15-year playing career in the NHL, which included three seasons with the Kings (1979-83). This past season, he served as Boston's Head Coach and compiled a 35-41-6 record. Previously he worked as a head coach (2002-04), associate coach (1996-02) and assistant coach (1988-96) with Detroit where he won three Stanley Cup championships in 1997, 1998 and 2002.

Following the 2002 season, Lewis was named as the Red Wings' head coach following the retirement of Scotty Bowman and he led the club to two 48-win and 100-plus point seasons, and two Central Division titles. The Red Wings also captured the Presidents' Trophy in 2003-04 with the League's top record at 48-21-11-2 (109 points), and in 2005-06 he worked for the team as a professional scout. In all, Lewis has a career head coaching record of 131-82-33 (21 ties).

Prior to coaching, Lewis enjoyed a successful NHL career as a defenseman from 1973-88. He played for the Kings for three seasons and served as the club's captain from 1981-83. He played in his 1,000th career game on April 1, 1987, while with Detroit and he retired on November 6, 1987, and then joined that team's coaching staff.

Originally selected by the New York Islanders in the third-round (33rd overall) of the 1973 NHL Amateur Draft, Lewis played two seasons of junior hockey with Saskatoon (WCHL) and then made the jump directly to the NHL after the Islanders selected him in the Draft. He played seven seasons in New York from 1973-80 before he was acquired by the Kings in a trade on March 10, 1980. During the 1982-83 season with the Kings, Lewis tied a career-high in games played with 79, and he also played in 18 career post-season games with the team from 1980-82.

After leaving the Kings in 1983, Lewis, 54 (7/3/53), played in New Jersey for three seasons before he played his final two years with the Red Wings. In all, Lewis played in 1,008 career regular season NHL contests and had 224 points (36-188=224) and 953 penalty minutes. In 91 career post-season NHL games, Lewis had 21 points (1-20=21) and 143 penalty minutes.

A native of Kindersley, Saskatchewan, Lewis and his wife Brenda have two children: a son Ryan and a daughter Megan.

JAMIE KOMPON - ASSISTANT COACH AND DIRECTOR OF AMATEUR DEVELOPMENT

Jamie Kompon is in his second season as an Assistant Coach with the Kings and in his first as Assistant Coach and Director of Amateur Development. He was named to the club's coaching staff on July 10, 2006.

Kompon, prior to coming to Los Angeles, worked for nine seasons with the St. Louis Blues organization where he most recently served as the club's Video Coach, a position he first held since 1997. He added Strength and Conditioning Coach to his title during the 2002-03 season, and in the spring of 2006 he was on the coaching staff of Team Canada at the World Championships in Latvia where he served as Video Coach.

Prior to joining the Blues, Kompon was an Assistant Coach with the Baltimore Bandits of the American Hockey League for the 1996-97 season and he also served as Co-Head Coach at McGill University in Montreal in 1994-95 after being employed there as an Assistant Coach for three seasons.

Born in Thunder Bay, Ontario, Kompon, 41 (9/18/66) also played four seasons as a defenseman at McGill (1985-89) and then he played two seasons of professional hockey, including stints in the East Coast Hockey League and in the German Elite League.

Jamie's wife's name is Tina. They reside in Hawthorne.

NELSON EMERSON - ASSISTANT COACH

Nelson Emerson is in his second season as an Assistant Coach with the Kings. He was named to the club's coaching staff on July 10, 2006.

Emerson had most recently served as the Head Coach for the Los Angeles Junior Kings Midget AAA Under-18 Team where he also held the title of Director of Hockey Operations. Born in Hamilton, Ontario, Emerson also worked as a Coaches Aide with the Kings during the 2003-04 season.

Prior to embarking on his coaching career, Emerson, a right wing, played with the Kings from 2000-02 and recorded 29 points (16-13=29) and 79 penalty minutes in 119 regular season NHL games. He also played in 19 playoff games with the Kings and had five points (2-3=5) and six penalty minutes. The Kings acquired Emerson and Kelly Buchberger from the Atlanta Thrashers for Donald Audette and Frantisek Kaberle on March 13, 2000.

Originally selected by the St. Louis Blues in the third-round (44th overall) of the 1985 NHL Entry Draft, Emerson recorded 488 points (195-293=488) and 575 penalty minutes in 771 career regular season NHL games with the Kings, Thrashers, Ottawa Senators, Chicago Blackhawks, Carolina Hurricanes/ Hartford Whalers, Winnipeg Jets and Blues. In 40 career NHL playoff games, he had 22 points (7-15=22) and 33 penalty minutes.

Prior to turning pro, Emerson, 40 (8/17/67) enjoyed four standout years at Bowling Green State University of the Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA), where he was a two-time All-America, a three-time CCHA All-Star and he was the school's all-time leading scorer with 294 points while becoming the first player to be a finalist for the Hobey Baker Award three different seasons. At Bowling Green, Emerson was a teammate of current Kings defenseman Rob Blake.

Nelson and his wife June have four children: daughters Mackenzie and Madelyn, and sons Quinn and Blake. They reside in Manhattan Beach.

BILL RANFORD - GOALTENDING COACH

Bill Ranford is in his second season as the Goaltending Coach with the Kings. He was named to his position on July 10, 2006.

Ranford, 40 (12/14/66), had worked as the Goaltending Consultant with the Vancouver Giants of the Western Hockey League for two seasons before joining the Kings. In addition, Ranford -- a two-time Stanley Cup Champion goalie with the Edmonton Oilers in 1988 and 1990 and the Conn Smythe Trophy winner as the playoff MVP in 1990 -- has also worked as a Goaltending Consultant with the Burnaby Express of the British Columbia Hockey League (Tier II Junior), of which he is a part-owner.

Ranford, who shares the NHL's single season playoff record for most wins by a goaltender with 16 victories in 1990, completed a stellar 15-year NHL playing career following the 1999-00 season. Originally selected by the Boston Bruins in the third-round (52nd overall) of the 1985 NHL Entry Draft, Ranford had a regular season record of 240-279-76, 15 shutouts, a 3.41 goals-against-average and a .888 save-percentage in 647 regular season NHL contests with the Oilers, Bruins, Detroit Red Wings, Tampa Bay Lightning and Washington Capitals. He also played in a total of a 51 NHL playoff games, and he played for the Oilers' alumni team at the outdoor Heritage Classic in 2003 in Alberta.

Ranford, an All-Star in 1991-92, made his acting debut in the movie *Miracle*, where he performed scenes as a "stunt double" of Jim Craig, Team USA's goalie during the 1980 Winter Olympics. He is a native of Brandon, Manitoba.

Bill and his wife Kelly have two children: daughters Cassidy and Tristan. They live in New Westminster, British Columbia.

CHAD SMITH - STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COACH

Chad Smith is in his first season as Strength and Conditioning Coach. He was appointed to the position on June 5, 2007.

Smith brings to the Kings a strong and varied background as both a strength and conditioning coach and as a world-class athlete. He graduated from the University of Tennessee where he was a top track and field athlete. He was a decathlete for more than 10 years and was a force on the World and the U.S. circuit. His dedication to the sport was recognized by being ranked No. 2 in the U.S. and No. 16 in the world.

Smith -- who also was a member of the U.S. Men's World Championship bobsled team and played college football at Ferris State -- has been exposed to a wide variety of training protocols through his experiences. Most recently, he was training many college and pro athletes, helping them to get both stronger and faster, with excellent results.

Chad, 33 (1/9/74), lives in Manhattan Beach.
